From Our Transition Pastor



ADVENT/CHRISTMAS

I am not sure about how I started to think about this – Seasonal Affective Disorder – but in some kind of odd way, it comes to mind when I think about the Church Year. You know we have to get through Advent; a period of waiting and of preparing for the coming of the Christ child at Christmas to get to Christmas, just as we go through Lent and Holy Week to get to Easter. The Church has to go through periods of penitence to get to promises of hope, forgiveness, and celebration.

But back to Seasonal Affective Disorder - I guess we can agree that the shorthand for this is S.A.D (sad!) and that a number of people are affected by this for several reasons. There is the fact of less daylight hours in the northern hemisphere, and people are impacted by the lengthened darkness. There is also the fact that people can be put more in touch with their loneliness depending on their social and family situations. It can be difficult to see other people having a grand time around family and other social situations and one is on the outside looking in.

And so I want us to consider where the church is in the midst of all this negative mood stuff, in a season that can offer us so much more. A couple of things. First, there is this season of Advent in which we, as a people of faith, are reminded to use this time not to wring our hands but to open our hands

and hearts to receive the infant Jesus. It is a time for introspection, a time to reflect on blessings and gifts that we already enjoy and to think about what opportunities we have to serve God and neighbor with these blessings and gifts. Secondly, the fact and metaphor of darkness can also be a tremendous gift. In this time of Advent, the church (small 'c') will go through a transformation made visible in the sanctuary. The ideal is that there will be a gradual transformation from "darkness" to "light." Greens, candles, decorations, and colorful red poinsettias will grace our sanctuary as we move closer and closer to the birth of the Savior, who is the Light of the world.

Finally, that is where the Church clashes, as it were, with culture. Indeed, as I write this, we have yet to celebrate Thanksgiving, and yet I cannot begin to count the number of homes which are fully decked out, decorated for Christmas. CVS, Walmart, Lowe's, and Home Depot have had most of the merchandise out for weeks and so it goes. Tongue in cheek, I am waiting for Santa Claus to get into a battle royale with the Easter Bunny – just wondering, just saying.

But here, we are the Church. We know for whom we wait; we know who comes to us as the gift of God at Christmas; we know the one who comes to us in human form, baby Jesus; and we know the one who will come to us at the end of time and beyond time as we know it. And so we pray in Advent and in all of the days of our lives.

Come. Come, Lord Jesus! Come quickly.

Transition Update from Mark Winzler

Approximately forty members of Concordia gathered on Sunday for an update on all things related to the transition process and to respond to questions which will aid the Council/Transition Team as we move forward. Those gathered......

- Were provided an update about interest by a couple of churches in purchasing our building
- Were given an update about conversations about a possible partnership being held with an Episcopal church
- Reviewed a sheet of "Facts about Concordia" (see next page)
- Reviewed a Chart of Remaining Options: Partnership. Merger, Holy Closure (on page following the "Facts")

Members then responded to the following questions at tables:

How are you feeling at this juncture in time as Concordia considers its future?

What questions do you have about any of the remaining options Partnership, Merger, Holy Closure?

Are you ready for Concordia to move out of Maintenance Ministry (Status Quo) and make a decision about formally exploring one of the three remaining options?

The responses gathered (each table had a Council/Transition Team Facilitator who took notes and then shared those with the whole group at the end of the meeting) will be forwarded to Associate to the Bishop Pastor Maria Hammons to aid her as she prepares to meet with us on:

Sunday, December 15 11:30 a.m. Kaiser Hall

A communication will be distributed beforehand with additional information.

Facts about Concordia



- We have about 90 people on our membership rolls (though, constitutionally, not all of them are voting members). Only those who both contribute and commune within the last year can vote. (In comparison: 50 years ago in 1974 we had 858 on the membership roll with 425 as communing/contributing.)
- More than 85% of those on our membership rolls are over the age of 60.
- **†** For 2024 there were 39 pledge units.
- *For 2024 there were 13 other units of people who did not pledge, but contributed.
- † Of those who pledged, the range is from \$100/year to \$24,000/year.
- † Of those who contributed but did not pledge, the range from \$1.00 to \$2,400 (as of July 31.)
- \$163,000 was the "pledged" amount included in the 2024 budget representing 39 pledges and those who do not pledge, but give.
- † The total budget was \$217,320.
- The deficit was \$15,620 because of additional income sources (legacy/use of building etc.,
- The deficit would have been \$53,000 without those additional income sources.
- While we basically have a renovated, up-todate building, we still have maintenance and repair issues. During 2024 those cost about \$48,000 to date.
- We finished doing our transition study and activities three years ago in November, 2021.

 We have been in maintenance ministry (status quo) ever since.

- The congregation was interested in a partnership with St. Mary's. They merged with St. John's Episcopal in Vernon.
- The consensus of the congregation in February, 2024 was not to pursue revitalization or radical redevelopment (bilingual).
- * We cannot afford a full-time pastor based on our income.
- If we were to call a full-time pastor, we would need at least \$100,000 in additional income (pledges).
- Three options remain to explore: partnership, merger or holy closure.
- If we were to be in partnership with a full-communion partner (episcopal etc.), we would need \$30,000-\$50,000 more in additional income
- * We will move immediately move into exploration of merger or holy Closure......
 - 1. If we lose \$15,000 in income during any year OR a loss of \$15,000 for the following year.
 - 2. If our average attendance falls below 35.
 - If we cannot meet minimum number of members to serve on Council, Legacy, or Memorial Garden.
 - 4. If we cannot maintain handful of people staffing the following: Ushers, Counters, Altar Guild, Lawn Mowing, Choir, Worship Assistants
- † During 2024 we have lost 2 pledge units: one due to death, the other (just this week) as the person asked to be removed from the membership rolls.

Highlights of the October 2024 Treasurer's Report

Summary

October envelope and other funding was 17% over the monthly budgeted amount and year-to-date 9% over the year-to-date budgeted amount. Overall revenue year-to-date is 90% through October which is 7% over the percentage of the total budget for ten (10) months into the year (83%). Reminder that our 2024 budget included \$15,000 from Legacy for Mission to support our benevolence commitments.

Year-to-date expenses through October was 23% over the percentage of the total budget for ten (10) months into the year (83%) primarily due to the steeple and boiler value repair work. From an overall budget perspective, the majority of these expenses were covered by the \$45,000 congregation approved withdrawal from Legacy for Mission endowment.

Thank you for your continued financial support throughout 2024.

I believe that with death coes freedom from earthly worries, pain, and sadness. So, in my mind, I did not see just white light bulbs, but instead, I felt that each light was the soul of someone now a light in Heaven and at peace.

It filled me with a feeling of spiritual calm. The families seemed to feel it too, for there were no tears or talk of sadness, just peacefulness and the sharing of memories.

My hope for you, is that at your Christmas table, you can free yourself from dwelling on



"the empty seat", and turn the holiday lights and focus on them. Let them light up forgotten memories, and like a magic carpet, take you back to that special person that you miss. If it is quiet around you, you may even hear their voice in your mind.

Celebrate the laughter, the special adventures spent together, even the tears. By remembering, a rather than pushing those memories back, it will bring your loved one closer. Those times are the tapestry of your life.

By remembering, you give life and form to your spirit and the spirit of your loved one. They are within you always. good attendance like last time? Come on Magic 8 Ball give me the answer I'm looking for!



The following is an excerpt from a sermon based on John 18:33-37 that was delivered by Lucy Tavares in Spanish and by me in English to Ministerio Nueva Creación on Sunday, November 24th. I hope you enjoy it.

Sermon title: What Is It Have You Done?

"What is it you have done?"

In today's gospel, Jesus is on trial before Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Judea. Pilate asks this question to Jesus upon hearing his case. I have said this many times before, and I'll say it again, I have always felt that Pilate has been given a bad rap. He could find no crime in what Jesus did and tried in numerous ways to let him go, only caving to the crowds and Hebrew leaders at the end. To be certain, I'm not saying Pilate was a great guy. One didn't get to be a Roman governor by being a nice guy. Pilate wielded power by brutally putting down all rebellions in the province.

As a kid, whenever I would hear "save us from the time of trial" in the traditional version of the Lord's prayer, I would always think about Jesus before Pilate, and then later about myself before St. Peter at the Pearly Gates having to account for myself in how I handled things in my life. But that is perhaps a superficial way of looking at it. One by dwelling in the past and the other by dwelling in the afterlife. What about now? In the contemporary version its "lead us not into temptation."

"Save us from the time of trial" or "lead us not into temptation" is about asking Jesus' protection to prevent us from facing troubles and avoiding the harm of bad decision-making. It's about the spirit leading your heart and rendering your prayers and supplications to the Lord. It's about taking responsibility for your life and actions and doing the things necessary to live rightly by loving our neighbors as ourselves and by helping those in need. In not doing immorally

sinful things and taking care of ourselves so as not to become burdens for others. It's about worshiping Jesus for all he's done for us and growing our faith beyond the four walls of the church and out there in everyday life. By sharing the good news of Christ with others and inviting them in.

We are all human. We make mistakes. We make poor judgements. We act on impulse. We fight, we gossip, we cheat whether it be on taxes or on diet, we cheat, we tell little fibs to rationalize something that isn't totally okay. You know what we do. We all do it. The key is to recognize it when you do it, think ahead of the ramifications, and imagine yourself on trial for it, and pray for protection and forgiveness. Pray for guidance to get back on the right path.

Sometimes this means saying sorry. Sometimes it requires making amends for those you've hurt by your actions.

Sometimes it means being there



for someone else, even if you'd rather be elsewhere. Sometimes it means cleaning up your act. By this I mean to stop doing things you know are not good for you in the long run.

What is it have you done? That is a great question we should each consider. Then consider how we need Jesus in our life to show us the way, and to be there for others who need our help. *Amen*.

individual contributions, so you can work at your own pace. 🔌 📯



CLC at GHIAA Power Summit, November 21, 2024

Thank you to everyone who joined us at the Greater Hartford Interfaith Action Alliance (GHIAA) Power Summit on November 21 at Weaver High School in Hartford, CT. We had a powerful evening filled with impactful stories and meaningful discussions.

Key highlights included:

- Housing Affordability: Community members shared personal experiences and the urgent need for affordable housing solutions. Public officials committed to exploring policy changes to address this critical issue.
- Fiscal Policy Reform: Attendees discussed the importance of equitable fiscal policies and urged decision-makers to consider reforms that benefit all residents, especially the most vulnerable.




