Hearing devices for the service are available upon request kindly contact an Usher **Introduction to the Service:** The Christmas season is celebrated for twelve days, ending with the Epiphany. Other traditions indicate that Christmas lasts for a full forty days, ending with the Feast of the Presentation of Jesus on February 2. It has become a still greater challenge to celebrate, as they deserve, the saints of the Christmas season: Stephen, December 26, who was the first to pay with his life for following the incarnate Lord Jesus; John, December 27, who was believed to have lived to great age in profound meditation on the Word made flesh; and the Holy Innocents, December 28, who draw our attention to the plight of children in a world where the implications of the birth of the Christ-child are not yet manifest. Also, New Year's Day, an important date in the civil, rather than the Christian, calendar, provides an occasion for giving thanks to God for the past year, and for committing the coming year into God's safe keeping.

January 1st has been known as Jesus's name day and recalls his circumcision, marking Mary and Joseph's obedience to the law. Finally, January 6 - Epiphany, is the culmination of the Christmas season, and focuses on the manifestation of God's glory. Today's Lessons and Carols Service draws on these traditions to help us continue our Christmas Celebration, even as we await the coming year. Lessons, carols, and prayer will help us to call to mind these saints and occasions of the Christmas season, as they bid us to continue to ponder the unwrapping of the gift of the Incarnation.

The First Day of Christmas December 25 The Nativity



The Blessing of the Crèche


A hallowed day has dawned upon us. Come and worship the Lord: **for a great light has shone on the earth.**

The Second Day of Christmas December 26 The Feast of St. Stephen, Deacon and Martyr

The Lesson Acts 6:8-15; 7:51-60

Stephen, full of grace and power, did great wonders and signs among the people. Then some of those who belonged to the synagogue of the Freedmen (as it was called), Cyrenians, Alexandrians, and others of those from Cilicia and Asia, stood up and argued with Stephen. But they could not withstand the wisdom and the Spirit with which he spoke. Then they secretly instigated some men to say, "We have heard him speak blasphemous words against Moses and God." They stirred up the people as well as the elders and the scribes; then they suddenly confronted him, seized him, and brought him before the council. They set up false witnesses who said, "This man never stops saying things against this holy place and the law; for we have heard him say that this Jesus of Nazareth will destroy this place and will change the customs that Moses handed on to us." And all who sat in the council looked intently at him, and they saw that his face was like the face of an angel.

After saying these things, Stephen concluded, You stiff-necked people, uncircumcised in heart and ears, you are forever opposing the Holy Spirit, just as your ancestors used to do. Which of the prophets did your ancestors not persecute? They killed those who foretold

the coming of the Righteous One, and now you have become his betrayers and murderers. You are the ones that received the law as ordained by angels, and yet you have not kept it."

When they heard these things, they became enraged and ground their teeth at Stephen.

But filled with the Holy Spirit, Stephen gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. Look, he said, "I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!" But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul.

While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he died.

The Acclamation

Stephen, full of grace and power, **did great wonders and signs among the people.** Precious in the sight of the Lord **is the death of his saints.**

The Collect

The Third Day of Christmas December 27 The Feast of John, Apostle and Evangelist

The Lesson John 1:1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

The Acclamation

This is the message we have heard, the message we proclaim: that God is light. In him there is no darkness at all. If we walk in the light as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin.

The Fourth Day of Christmas December 28 The Holy Innocents, Martyrs

The Lesson Matthew 2:13-18

Now after they had left, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, "Get up, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you; for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him." Then Joseph got up, took the child and his mother by night, and went to Egypt, and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill

what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet, "Out of Egypt I have called my son."

When Herod saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated, and he sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according

to the time that he had learned from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah:

"A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children; she refused to be consoled, because they are no more."

Let the little children come to me for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these. Whoever does not receive the kingdom of heaven like a child will never enter it.

The Seventh Day of Christmas December 31 New Year's Eve

The Lesson Ecclesiastes 3:1-13

For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven: a time to be born, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to pluck up what is planted; a time to kill, and a time to heal; a time to break down, and a time to build up; a time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance; a time to throw away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing; a time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to throw away; a time to tear, and a time to sew; a time to keep silence, and a time to speak; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

What gain have the workers from their toil? I have seen the business that God has given to everyone to be busy with. He has made everything suitable for its time; moreover he has put a sense of past and future into their minds, yet they cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end. I know that there is nothing better for them than to be happy and enjoy themselves as long as they live; ¹moreover, it is God's gift that all should eat and drink and take pleasure in all their toil.

A thousand years in God's sight are like a single day. Like an evening that has already gone. Christ is the first and the last, the beginning and the end. Jesus stands at the door and knocks. Lord Jesus, enter our homes and our lives. You hold the key to God's way of justice. Open to us your kingdom of peace.

The Eighth Day of Christmas January 1 The Name Day of Jesus (Feast of the Circumcision)

The Lesson Luke 2:15-21

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known

to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them. After eight days had passed, it was time to circumcise the child; and he was called Jesus, the name given by the angel before he was conceived in the womb.

The Acclamation

You will name him Jesus; he will save his people from their sins. He will be great; he will be called the Son of the Most High. He will be called Emmanuel: God is with us.

The Twelfth Day of Christmas January 5 Twelfth Night The Feast of Merrymaking and Mischief and the Visit of the Magi

The Lesson Matthew 2:1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage."

When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy.


On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

During the Carol, the altar is set.




The Offertory Prayer



The Lord's Prayer


Rejoicing in the presence of God here among us, as our Savior taught us, so we pray:

Blessing


